2. **Samarth Festival:** Samarth Festival cuts across the issues like enlightenment of students and people, blood donation, prevention of farmers' suicide, prevention of female foeticide, women empowerment, organisation of lecture series, Yoga and Pranayama, free accommodation and lunch facility, constructing check-dams, free health diagnosis camps, cleanliness campaign, adoption of villages, tree plantation, conduct of musical concerts, organisation of elocution, debate, essay writing, quiz, colour design (rangoli), henna, beautiful handwriting, etc. competitions.

The NSS unit of the college has been involved in accelerating the above activities during the Samarth Festival. Every year a lecture series has been organised to enlighten the students and community. The lecture series has been addressed by the eminent speakers and scholars from across Maharashtra and beyond. Considering the social responsibility and hospital emergency, the college organises blood donation camps and sends blood to the blood banks. The college organises free health diagnosis camp every year to bring about health consciousness among the students.
